Join us for the 25th annual benefit auction Friday, Nov. 3, at the Johnson County Library. The auction begins at 6 p.m. with the reception and silent auction, followed by the oral auction at 7:30 p.m. Our theme this year is "A Night on Broadway." Tickets go on sale this month at the library for \$20 apiece. Brannian Auctions LLC will preside and the event

will be catered by Sagewood Café. Coffee will be provided by The Fix, and the Library Foundation will provide wine.

Proceeds of this auction will benefit the library's endowment fund. Over the past several years, donations have raised about \$259,000, which earned the library a \$653,000 match from the State of Wyoming. The interest from the endowment may be used by the library but the balance must remain

Why is it 'Copman's Tomb'?

This is the first part of two compiled by Local History librarian Nancy Tabb.

Each evening as the sun prepares to kiss the gorgeous Big Horn range of mountains good night, its golden rays rest upon a great cliff that stands in the very center of the Shell creek area, and the gold of the sun and the yellow of the cliff combine to make what the old-timers of that section have been pleased to refer to as "Copman's Tomb," a beacon of good cheer to all of those who, within a

Johnson County Library Foundation

The endowment fund began in 2008 with legislation that promised matching funds from the State of Wyoming for money raised by private donations to Wyoming libraries. Johnson County was slated to benefit from a 2:1 match—for every \$1 raised, the state would provide \$2. To date, JCL has raised about \$259,000—thanks in great part to the annual auction which is partially sponsored by the Johnson County Library Foundation—and received \$653,000 in state funds.

circle of many, many miles, may turn their gaze in the direction of the Big Horns.

Copman's Tomb is located just to the left of the highway as one climbs the mountains over the Shell-Sheridan highway. It stands out at an altitude of over seven thousand feet. The face of the cliff is estimated to drop around five hundred feet from its topmost point to the base, and it is sheer. It is said that a car may be driven to a point within a mile or less of the top, and that a trail can be taken from there for the rest of the trip.

It is a majestic pile, stately in its grandeur, and one which is bound to command the enthusiastic admiration of the truly beautiful in our glorious mountain ranges.

In our quest for the answer to the question of "Why Is It Called Copman's Tomb," we had asked a number of old timers, but could not get a satisfactory answer. A couple of months ago, while visiting Charlie Trone, we got some information which enabled us to follow certain trails that finally led us to what we believe will make an interesting story.

The part of the story as told by Charlie that intrigued us most was that he had been told that one time in his life in the Big Horns "Jack" Copman had made a model of an airplane, and when asked what he was going to do with it, he had said that when he had completed his plane he was going to take it to the top of that great cliff and make a trial flight. If he managed to fly, it would be a great day for him, but if he failed that cliff would be his tomb.

In our efforts to get the facts, we failed to get any information that would confirm this story, but we did get a lot of interesting facts.

According to "Progressive Men of the state of Wyoming," 1903, Jack Copman was born in Pennsylvania, April 15, 1850, where he lived until the age of sixteen, attending school and assisting his parents on their farm. In 1866 he moved to Kansas, where he spent a year, then moved on to Washington, Oregon and Idaho, spending his time in mining and riding the range. In 1880 he brought a drove of cattle to Wyoming from the Grand Ronde Valley of Oregon for H. C. Lovell.

Just how long Copman remained in the employ of Lovell is not known, but it is known that he spent considerable time prospecting and trapping foxes in the mountains of the Upper Shell creek area. During some of this time he was engaged as a guide for an Australian named Clark who had come into this country from Tasmania, hunting big game. He and Copman built a cabin in what is now known as Clark's timber, near the head of White creek, and while Clark made his home in this cabin Copman made his headquarters in a dugout, perhaps a half mile away, on what old timers call Copman's gulch.



Pick up your reading sheets at the children's room desks.




